1. Chairman's Report

Thank you all for coming here today. An AGM forms an integral part of running an organization and it gives everyone a good opportunity to come together to share, appraise and account for the year's events. As such, you will notice a suite of reports including the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2009.

A year has flown by, it feels like it was only yesterday we had the Xmas party...then again that's probably because we've had quite a few parties lately! It's been a hectic first year for me, having to learn a lot in a short space of time has been challenging and so much has gone on, I'm not sure how I'm going to fit it all in my short report!

But to note just a few events:

- The Special General Meeting (SGM) in Dharamsala – November 2008

- Tibetan Communities in Europe (TCiE) Meeting Barcelona – February 2009

- Wen Jiabao & Hu Jintao visit – Apr/May 2009
- Annual TCB Picnic – May 2009
- Tibetan Festivals – Saga Dawa/Lhabab Dus-chen
- HHDL Birthday – Jul 2009 although out of accounting year
- Representatives changeover – Aug 2009 also out of account year

Personally, I've found the past year to be a real eye opener and a great learning curve. It has also been a great opportunity for me to put something back into the community and ultimately make a small difference to the greater Tibetan cause. Without Tibet, without being born a Tibetan, I may never have been in the refugee status most of us are born in. We may have been born as a rich westerner with our own country and complete freedom. But having been born into a Tibetan family, then I think you have to accept that fate and the obligation to do our part for the Tibetan Struggle. There is no point in saying you are Tibetan, in trying to demonstrate at the Chinese regime that deprives millions of our fellow Tibetan of the basic right to live as free human beings, to live the Tibetan way of life if we are not doing that ourselves here, in a free country. So I think it's vital that we do our best to preserve our unique way of life, to keep the spirit of Tibet alive even after Tibet is free. And rather than leave it there, I would like to suggest a number of ways of doing this:

1. To attend community functions
2. To speak in Tibetan to your children and to each other
3. To send your children to Tibetan language classes held at the OoT
4. To join the dance group
5. To officially join the TCB and pay the annual membership of £10
6. To offer your assistance during events or at any time
7. To volunteer to be on the council
8. Do prayers and attend religious functions such as Saga Dawa

Finally, I would like to thank everyone connected with the TCB for their efforts and continued support especially to the council members, the dance group and all the regular members who are never far away. Please keep up the good work and let's work together to be even better and to make a positive contribution not just to the Tibetan cause but the world.

2. General Secretary's Report

I'm pleased to report the following to our Tibetan Community members. Since assuming the Secretary's role, I was able to serve our members and the interest of Tibetan Community by working closely with my colleagues on the Council and partner organisations.

Communications with TCB Members

I regard that the communication with our members is very important. So, soon after assuming the Secretary's role in January this year, I started sending TCB *Community Newsletters* and *e-Circulars* to our members. I have made every effort to include our Tibetan Government-in-Exile's important notices including Statements from His Holiness the Dalai Lama, The Kashag and the Tibetan Parliament in Exile.

A special effort was also made to include independent thoughts, personal experiences and written work of fellow Tibetans and writers living in the UK as well as abroad, in our publications – creating links with them. As part of improving and strengthening communication with our members, I was able to introduce two main formal channels as below:

- (a) **TCB: Community Newsletters** was sent to our members in February and June, and the next one is due in October. I hope this channel of communication would continue, which is also published online.
- (b) **TCB: e-Circular** is free and we also use this channel to communicate with our members. When sending Newsletters, we often need to consider the costs involved including its printing and postage. This form of communication also serves as a follow-up with printed Community Newsletters. We recently sent our e-Circulars in March and July, and the next one is due in November.

Recording Minutes of the Council Meetings is part of General Secretary's role. As this forms a formal communication between the Council Members, we record this at every meeting that we have.

Press Releases and News Reports: For our past events, we produced several news reports and press releases, which were widely circulated in Tibetan media. We have also circulated these on TSGs list.

Supporting Fellow Council Members: I was able to encourage and assist fellow council members especially the younger ones, who are first time serving on the TCB Council.

TCB Membership: For sustaining the Tibetan Community's continued service to its members and bigger roles of highlighting Tibetan issue in general here in the UK, its membership contribution will become vital in the future. Presently, only few Tibetan members continue to pay their annual membership fees. Working with our Membership Officer and fellow Council Members, I have tried my bit towards this effort. I must acknowledge that so far we have received poor response from our members. We will continue to make more efforts on this front in the future. Our Tibetan members ought to feel that they too have responsibilities to cooperate with the Council Members' efforts by making contribution to this annual subscription. We should work together to develop our community further.

Maintaining contact with Tibet-related organisations, Buddhist centres and general public: A number of queries from the general public were responded whenever we could positively. We also like to acknowledge the cooperation we received from various Tibet-related organisations and particularly Rigpa Buddhist and Palyul Buddhist centres, when Tibetan Community decided to host Special Prayers to honour late Kyabje Penor Rinpoche at a short notice. I must also acknowledge our member, Padma Dolma, a Tibetan student at SOAS for her swift cooperation when we organised a panel discussion with Tibetan scholars from India, USA, Canada and the UK in May.

Future Improvement: There is certainly room for further improvements. Firstly, I think cooperation from our members is utterly important and elected Council Members need to take their elected roles more seriously. Wherever possible, we must plan our activities in a way that it helps towards long term development of our community. At the moment we lack strategic thinking/planning. Secondly, we need to change the way we function as a community. So, I propose TCB employs someone, initially, either on project basis or part time. We should set-up more sub-committees, which has the mandates to undertake Tibetan Community's important tasks.

Acknowledgements: I am very grateful to all those who have sincerely supported me and my initiatives to further the interest of Tibetan Community and wider cause. I particularly would like to acknowledge the support I received from Philippa Carrick and Tibet Relief Fund over the past many months.

4. Sponsorship Secretary's Report

The sponsorship scheme was set up by the Tibetan Community in Britain in the late 1970s. As the Community gradually began to undertake more charitable projects in India and Nepal, the Tibetan Community in Britain was able to establish the Tibetan Refugee Charitable Trust. This was done in 1986 with blessing of His Holiness the Dalai Lama who graciously agreed to be its Patron. The Trust was formally registered as a charity with the Charitable Commission in the UK with the following objectives:

- To advance the education of the Tibetan refugee children
- To preserve and promote the cultural heritage of Tibet through study, research and publications.
- To relieve poverty and hardship among Tibetans in exile

One of the Trust's major achievements has been in raising funds and finding sponsors for supporting the education of destitute Tibetan children in India. At present we have sponsors for 116 children, supported mainly by our friends in Britain. We also have sponsors from the United States of America, Australia, Switzerland, Greece and the Netherlands.

Fees

I am pleased to inform our members that the Trust sent the Department of Education in Dharamsala, a sum of £22009.61 for fees and pocket money for the period between August 2008 to July 2009.

Compared with last year, we have managed to send slightly more money this year, but regrettably, due to changes of circumstances, a few sponsors have also withdrawn from the scheme this year.

Completing school

This year four of our children have completed school, and I am pleased to say that the sponsors of three of the children wish to continue to help with their further studies. I informed the Department of Education, who advised me to inform these sponsors to send the money for further studies directly to the children through Western Union. I have passed the information to them accordingly.

Gift Aid Declaration

Responding to our requests, 62 sponsors have kindly completed and returned the Gift Aid Declaration form. As a result we have received tax reclaim from HM Revenues and Customs for all the associated donations.

Correspondence and expenses

In an effort to communicate with sponsors and the Department of Education, a total of 276 letters (excluding Christmas cards sent in Dec 2008) have been sent out during the year. This mainly involves sending letters and school reports from our children sent to us by the Department of Education and also sending letters from sponsors to India through DoE.

This has incurred a cost of £139.30 for postage and stationery. This is not shown in this year's account as it is yet to be claimed, but it will be shown in the next account report. The expenses for copy paper and telephone calls to sponsors, and occasionally to the Department of Education, have been my contribution.

First and foremost I would like to thank all of our sponsors for their continued generosity and kind support for the education of Tibetan children. I would also like to thank Mr Stephen Simou who has kindly presented the Trust account for the last year free of charge. Last, but by no means least I would like to thank Mr Sonam Frasi in helping to prepare the Trust report every year but for being my source of information on every aspect of Trust. As he was one of the main founding members of the Tibetan Refugee Charitable Trust, his knowledge is invaluable.

5. Campaign Report

Tibet and Tibetans: Although Tibetans have lost their freedom 50 years ago, under International Law Tibet today is still an independent state under illegal occupation by People's Republic of China.

Tibetan people, both inside Tibet and in exile, particularly the younger generations continue to keep alive the Tibetan nation's consciousness in the face of harsh and relentless repressions by the Chinese authorities by immense sacrifices with unbreakable spirit for freedom and justice based on the principle of truth and non-violence, under the leadership of His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama of Tibet.

No Celebration of Losar 2009

In solidarity with Tibetans inside Tibet, Tibetans in exile and our supporters have intensified our non-violent campaigns globally, urging actions by world leaders, international bodies, rights groups and individuals to put pressure on and held the Chinese government account for its dreadful repressions in Tibet. The two key campaign aspects has been reaching out directly on the Chinese people of the real issues facing Tibet, rather than the one-sided propaganda by the Chinese government and galvanizing Tibetans for grass-root level participation.

Being based in the global campaign/action hot bed, that is London, Tibetan Community in Britain (TCB) continues to play a crucial role in campaigning for the rights and freedom of Tibetan people in the UK along with other UK-based Tibet Support Groups.

The following report is a summary of campaign activities/actions TCB has undertaken, since September 2008, which we intend to share with our members and supporters.

60th Anniversary of CCP (1st October)

China's Communist Party will mark its 60th anniversary on 1st October 2009. Having been responsible for the deaths of over 40 million people in the course just 60 years, including over one million Tibetans, there is nothing to be proud about or celebrate on the day.

TCB along with other UK Tibet Support Groups will be working in solidarity with UK Uighur community and Chinese community, including members of the Chinese students and democracy activists, to launch campaigns calling for "Time Up!" on the dictatorial Communist Party of China. Events will include film screenings at various venues, an exhibition and a mass protest on the day itself. (Details coming shortly...)

Release Dhondup Wangchen

On 6th August 2009, Tibetans and our supporters protested in front of the Chinese Embassy, braving the heavy torrential rain calling for the immediate release of Dhondup Wangchen, the film-maker of "*Leaving Fear Behind*" (*Jigdrel*) and demanding fair trials for all detained Tibetans.

Stop Death Sentences in Tibet

As the news about the death sentences passed on five Tibetans (Lobsang Gyaltsen, Loyak, Tenzin Phuntsok and Kagtstok) emerged, a mass protest (20th April) and appeal letters were organized at the Chinese Embassy demanding all the death sentences be quashed and all detained Tibetans not to be tortured and to be given fair trial. It also called for an independent enquiry into the 2008 Uprising in Tibet and to provide a list of all detained and missing Tibetans since then.

HH Panchen Rinpoche's 20th birthday

This year as His Holiness Gedhun Choekyi Nyima, the 11th Panchen Lama turns 20 years of age; there is still no information about His Holiness's well-being and whereabouts since his abduction by the Chinese authorities in 1995 along with his family.

Tibetans and our supporters gathered at the Chinese Embassy on 25th April, delivered a birthday card under the embassy door and held a minute's silence, followed by prayers for the wellbeing and freedom of HH Panchen Rinpoche from Chinese captivity.

G20 Protest against Hu Jintao

Tibetan Community in Britain organized a mass demonstration and a 24hour Hunger Strike, led by six Tibetans and four Chinese activists outside the Mandarin Oriental Hotel, Knightsbridge where Hu Jintao was staying from 2nd April 2009.

The protest and the hunger strike condemned and highlighted the gross violation of human rights by the Chinese regime under Hu Jintao, particularly in Tibet. A candle lit vigil was attended by Chinese democracy activists, Falong Gong followers and Burmese community members as well as Tibet groups. The vigil concluded the hunger strike with stern condemnation of Hu Jintao's total lack of respect for human rights of people.

The 50th Anniversary of the Tibetan People's National Uprising Day, 2009

For the commemoration of the 50th Tibetan National Uprising of 1959 against the illegal occupation by the People's Republic of China, TCB organized in coalition with the UK based Tibet Support Groups including Tibet Society, Free Tibet, SFTUK and TYUK.

1. Freedom march & rally in Trafalgar Square on 7th March
2. Mass lobbying of UK MPs for Tibet at the Houses of Parliament on 10th March.

At the rally, Ven. Palden Gyatso, Hon. Norman Baker, MP and Shao Jiang, Chinese democracy activist were the key speakers. The first mass lobby for Tibet was success with over 300 people including over 100 Tibetans taking part. Subsequent emails to our members encouraged our members to build on this contact created with the MPs.

In response to the unprecedented calls of "No celebration of Losar" from Tibetans inside Tibet and in line with world-wide Tibet movement, TCB cancelled this year's Losar celebrations to mourn and pay homage to Tibetans killed in last year's Uprising, Tibetans who are still unaccounted for and the thousands still languishing in the Chinese prisons for protesting against the illegal occupation.

Tibetan Community in Britain organized a solemn yet a powerful candle lit vigil outside the PRC's embassy on 26th February 2009 in London and a community Losar prayer gathering on 28th February where members of the community extended prayers for Tibetans inside Tibet and for the freedom of Tibet.

Protest at Wen Jiabao's UK visit

The visit of the Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao from 31st January to 2nd February triggered a series of protests by Tibetans and our supporters in London and Cambridge.

Wen Jiabao was called to account for the deaths and disappearance of thousands of Tibetans since March 2008 and to stop the repressive 'Strike Hard' campaigns in Tibet. UK PM Gordon Brown publicly urged China to 'resolve the underlying issues in Tibet'.

Five members of the community were arrested and cautioned by the police. Wen Jiabao's visit was concluded with the famous 'Shoe Throwing' protest by Martin Jahnke, a student at Cambridge University.

Other campaign related activities:

The Annual UK-China Human Rights Dialogue was held on 12th January 2009. Prior to this dialogue, representatives of the Tibetan Community in Britain briefed the concerned British officials at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) on the fundamentals human rights issues of Tibetans inside Tibet, i.e. the Strike Hard campaigns, forced re-education, forced relocation of Tibetan nomadic communities, arbitrary detentions, use of torture, influx of Chinese migrants and various individuals cases of Tibetans political prisoners, including that of the Panchen Lama.

The conferences at Westminster University titled 'Democratic Reform in Tibet' and 'Modern Tibet: Views from China' provided concerned Tibetans and supporters a chance to hear, engage and challenge directly these so-called 'scholars' on Tibet from China. Tibetan Community Campaign Team coordinated attendance of concerned Tibetans at these conferences to counter the Chinese government's propaganda on Tibet. Subsequently the organizer organized another conference titled 'Alternative Futures for Tibet and the Tibetan Diaspora' with independent academics and scholars from outside China.

One of our Campaign Managers, Phurbu attended for the final court hearing of Martin Jahnke at Cambridge Magistrate Court where Martin has been cleared of committing any offence and released without charge regarding his 'Shoe Throwing' protest at Wen Jiabao. Phurbu offered traditional Khata to Martin and thanked him for his brave action against the Chinese regime.

Conclusion:

The current moment is so crucial for Tibet that every individual Tibetan must put real effort for the cause of Tibet's freedom in whatever form or interest one chooses. Looking back over the past year, Tibetan Community in Britain has managed to organize and coordinate various protest and actions successfully. We owe enormously to all the UK-based Tibet Support Groups and individuals supporters and fellow Tibetans, who have all been so committed and supportive for the cause of Tibet. Without your support, our campaign

activities would not have been a success for sure, therefore, we extend our heartfelt 'Thank you' and deep appreciation for your support.

Working in the council, particularly in the campaign team has been a real challenge as well as an honour. We have managed to mobilize Tibetans in various campaign actions as well as build networks with many organizations and individuals, particularly reaching out to the Chinese people. Organizing event for the 60 PRC founding anniversary in October with Uighur community in the UK, Chinese democracy activists, students and other Chinese groups is indeed exciting and new in the UK at least. As time go, we look forward to all sorts of new ideas and tactics and knowledge to campaign for Tibet and no doubt, soon the flame of Tibet's truth will thresh into pieces Chinese Government's propaganda.

Finally, we pray for the long live of His Holiness the Dalai Lama and the immediate resolution of the Tibet issue, whereby Tibetans in and outside Tibet will re-unite in celebration. Tashi Delek and Bod Gyalo!!

6. Culture Secretary's Report

The Tibetan Community Dance Group, formed in 1995, is the cultural wing of the Tibetan Community in Britain. The main aim of the Tibetan Community Dance Group is to preserve and promote the unique artistic heritage of Tibet through performing arts in the UK and beyond. The Group endeavours to learn from masters of music, dance and theatrical traditions of Tibet, a variety of folk dances, songs, court and ceremonial dances.

The Group also aims to introduce the richness of the Tibetan artistic culture to people throughout the world, so that others can enjoy and appreciate some of the music, songs and dances of Tibet.

The Tibetan Community Dance Group continues to perform in the UK and abroad at the invitation of the various hosts. In UK, the Group performs for annual events in March and July.

1. In March, members of the Tibetan Community Dance Group led and presented following items to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Tibetan National Uprising Day at Trafalgar Square in London.
 - Tibetan National Anthem
 - Mimang Langlu (Longsho)
 - Den-Tsik Monlam
2. For His Holiness' 74th birthday, the senior and junior members of the Tibetan Community Dance Group practised every Sundays for 2 months (May and June) at the Highbury Roundhouse Studio, north London. They performed following items at the Conway Hall on 5th July:
 - Dhukchu yangdhen by seniors and juniors.
 - Khuyug khuyug dance by the seniors.
 - Suk Zema lak dance by the juniors.
 - Group song by the Seniors
 - Group song by the juniors.

I wish to thank members of the Tibetan Community Dance Group for their continued participation. I also acknowledge the contribution made by Dhoeghar Ghen-las including Diki Ghung and Mingmar Yangchen. I also wish to thank Sonam la, Tsering Yangzom la and Hishi Shakya la for their wonderful assistance over the past many months.

I hope more members of our community can join TCB dance group in the coming months. Please get in touch with me if you would like to know more about our dance group.

7. Young Tibetans' Educational Club (Y-TEC) Report - 2009

Y-TEC is a wing of Tibetan Community in Britain set up for the Tibetan children and teenagers in the U K. The aims and objectives of Y-TEC are to help Tibetan children and teenagers to:

- *Develop personal and social skills*
- *Preserve Tibetan language, culture and heritage*
- *Strengthen self-confidence and Tibetan identity*
- *Develop friendships with other Tibetan children*
- *Have an opportunity to participate in new experiences e.g. outdoor activities*

Y-TEC hopes to address these objectives via an annual 5 day summer camp.

This year (2009) saw the third camp of it's kind since it formed in 2006. The camp was held between Monday the 27th July to Friday the 31st July 2009. For the second year running, camp was held at the Woodland Centre of Ruskin Mill Educational College, set in the scenic Nailsworth valley of Cotswolds, Gloucestershire. The venue was kindly offered without cost to us by Ruskin Mill Educational Trust. It has been the second year of the College hosting our camp.

This year the camp had the highest attendance to date, of 48 campers including children, youth leaders/volunteers and parents. The camp uses informal education methods to encourage the children to learn more about their Tibetan heritage. The camp itinerary is as attached, to give an idea of the various workshops and activities, run during the course of the 5 days. In addition to the workshops, every year, the children are given the opportunity to participate in outdoor activities, which are designed to promote self confidence and develop team work. This year, included a high ropes/climbing activity and windsurfing/sailing.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Y-TEC accounts are held as a community instant reserve account under the name of "Young Tibetans Educational Club". The account has three signatories of which two are always required to endorse any transactions. Traditionally, this has been agreed to be 1) Y-TEC camp organiser (Tenzin Takla) and 2) TCB Chairperson (Pempha Lobsang). The third signatory is at present, due for review.
